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Editorial:

To have or not to have - That is **NOT** the question!

The inter-island Cook Strait ferries are in the news again, for all the wrong reasons. The water that joins New Zealand's two main islands is vital to the national economy. While it can be a turbulent stretch of water, the often coined "continuation of our No.1 State Highway", it is an important piece of our national infrastructure. Apart from freight considerations, the ferries provide essential transport between the islands, for both domestic passengers and overseas tourists together numbering over 800,000 each year. In addition to this, about 15 billion dollars of cargo crosses the strait by ship yearly.

The Cook Strait ferry crossing is 96 kilometres and takes around three and a half hours. The recent government decision to scrap the order for new ferries at a time when recent and continuous high profile events involving the aging fleet is beyond belief. While we will always have to contend with timetable delays due to unpredictable weather conditions and peak loading during holiday periods, delays caused by aging infrastructure and insufficient capacity is not acceptable.



It has been proved that the inter-island ferries with roll-on-roll-off capability provide the most efficient method of moving bulk goods across the strait. This should be encouraged and extended if only to limit the number of heavy vehicles on our roads. Regardless of who owns and who controls the inter-island ferry service, an efficient and modern fleet of ships fit for purpose is essential to meet the demand that is never going to lessen. This is absolutely essential and needs to be one of the government's transport priorities.



To suggest that the roll-on-roll-off ferries be replaced with trucks, containers and forklifts is an absolute nonsense. Likewise the idea of purchasing smaller second hand vessels to meet the demand. Taking this approach has been fraught with problems in the past mainly the disruption to passenger and freight services due to mechanical issues coupled with wear and tear. The cancellation of existing new ferry contracts will add to the sum already spent on upgrading essential infrastructure estimated to be in the region of \$442 million. Any further delay in upgrading the ships and infrastructure at both Wellington and Picton is estimated to increase 40%. the costs by Modern fit-for-purpose ferries are absolutely essential to sustain our national economy. The Cook Strait should be officially included in the government's national roads of significance. To have or not to have is NOT the question. The question is - how much longer do we put up with a 'third world country' service across Cook Strait?



Remembering John Wayne:

The Duke - The man who shot 'Liberty Valance'

Marion Michael Morrison aka John Wayne was born in Iowa, U.S. Wayne was a successful actor who embodied the image of the strong but quietly forceful personality who did not waste his words. The nickname 'Duke' has no royal connection. When he was young he never went anywhere without his dog, an airedale terrier named "Little Duke". As a result neighbours and friends started calling him "Big Duke" which he preferred to the name Marion and the name stuck for the rest of his life. Tall from an early age, he played football for his high school in Glendale and later the University of Southern California.

While at university, Western star Tom Mix got him a summer job in the prop department in exchange for football tickets. His film career started in the late 1920s when he appeared in a number of silent films by director John Ford. His first starring role was in the 1930 epic Western, The Big Trail in which the director gave him the stage name of John Wayne.

Although appearing in many war films and frequently being presented as the "All American Hero", Wayne never served in the armed forces. However, his close friend Bob Hope was recorded as saying that Wayne did more for the WW2 war effort than he could ever do on the battlefield.


Between 1940, when the military draft was reinstated and the end of WW2 in 1945, he remained in Hollywood and made 21 movies. His draft records were amended to read 'deferment in the national interest'. His manly macho roles made Wayne a huge star with men and women alike.






Wayne received considerable criticism throughout his career by those who considered him typecast in westerns and war movies. However his ability to show quiet tenderness in many of the complex characters he played was overlooked. John Wayne was also the subject of controversy with his outspoken right-wing politics but he has generally been accepted as a larger than life Hollywood icon and many have said that he was the greatest star of all time.





John Wayne died at the age of 72 after battling cancer for several decades.



Tired eyes -

Tired eyes can easily be cause by irritation, too much crying or simple tiredness. Tea bags can help and they are warmer and more pleasant than ice cubes or cucumber slices!

The Beatles were frustrated too and left the stage for a time until order was restored.

There were times during the concert that fans had to be manhandled for their own safety. Given the vast number inside and out, we were lucky not to have had a full scale riot on our hands.

John D. Rockefeller 1839-1937

At the time of his death, Rockefeller was worth a cool **US\$340 Billion!**


Henry Ford 1863-1947






Bullitt (Bullitt) -




The librarian's a friend who loves to lend, So see if there's a book that she can recommend. Read that book, and if you're bitten You can borrow all the other ones the author's written.





My teacher took my iPod. She said they had a rule; I couldn't bring it into class or even to the school.


She said she would return it: I'd have it back that day. But then she tried my headphones on and gave a click on play.

The Life and Times of Howard Morrison:

Howard Leslie Morrison OBE was one of the most famous and loved entertainers in New Zealand who became a household name from the early 1960s. He was responsible for bringing Maori culture to the mainstream of New Zealand society and became one of the countries leading television and concert performers.


His early introduction to music included listening to veterans of the Maori Battalion sing songs at parties, Sunday hymns at church and the Hit Parade radio program. He enjoyed mimicking the songs and learning to sing harmonies. While boarding at Te Aute Boys High School in Hawkes Bay he developed the ability to entertain audiences by using humour and timing. Howard left school at 16 and gained employment at the Whakatu Freezing Works where he often sang to entertain other workers. In the 1950s he joined the Clive Trio where he learnt how to lead a song, sing in harmony and work out arrangement in a variety of styles. In 1956, Morrison toured Australia with the Aotearoa Concert Party which was an important step to him becoming a professional entertainer.

Following his return from Australia Morrison formed a vocal group which later became the famed 'Howard Morrison Quartet'. They sang Maori favourites, country, pop and Italian songs, most with an element of comedy with Morrison in the lead.



In 1960 a song called 'Battle of The Waikato' became an instant hit, selling over 25,000 copies. Another parody, 'My Old Man's an All Black' sold 60,000 copies. The Quartet managed by Harry M. Miller performed a number of sold out nationwide concerts and the group performed in the first public television broadcast in 1960.

The Howard Morrison Quartet decided to disband in 1965 following a final farewell tour. They were instrumental in the introduction of many 'firsts' in the music industry including the coordination of record releases and tours, the use of media for promotion and the widespread acceptance of Maori culture as entertainment of a Pakeha audience. After the Quartet disbanded, Morrison become a solo performer and won the 1966 Entertainer of The Year award.



Sir Howard Morrison 1935-2009

He toured the country with Lonnie Donegan and The Everly Brothers and was a guest on the Dinah Shore Show. Morrison opened the 1990 Commonwealth Games Auckland and in the same year was knighted for services to entertainment. He wanted to use his high profile for the benefit of disadvantaged Maori and in horseback 1990. he rode on throughout the country, raising \$1.2 million for the Life Education Trust.

Morrison died at home in Rotorua on 24 September 2009, aged 74.


The country mourned a popular entertainer whose charm and charisma had navigated two cultures for the benefit of both.




Famous Lawmen of The Wild West:

Life in the Wild West was hard for everyone






